Youth Shelters and Family Services delivers life-changing shelter and support for homeless, runaway and in-crisis youth. Our vision is to end youth homelessness. Last year, through our programs in Santa Fe, we provided 9,686 bed nights and 11,406 case management hours for 926 young people (duplicated).

YOUTH EMERGENCY SHELTER

We are a 24-hour shelter with a full range of services, including access to education, tutoring and case management for youth ages 10-17 who are in crisis and need a safe place to stay. Established in 1980. Located at 5686 A Agua Fria St.

2,825 nights of shelter provided

4,405 hours of case management and life skills education provided

TRANSITIONAL LIVING AND SUPPORTIVE RE-HOUSING PROGRAMS

Transitional Living Program (TLP) is a supervised apartment setting for homeless youth, ages 17-24, including pregnant and parenting teens. Youth gain education, workforce skills and life skills so they can move out on their own and become independent. Established in 1990. The Supportive Transitions to Adulthood through Re-housing Program (STAR) helps independent youth find and move into their own apartments around Santa Fe. Youth are offered ongoing support services which help them access education, employment and health needs. Established in 2016. The TLP and STAR offices are located at 4435 Airport Rd.

24 youth and children served including: **2** pregnant parenting youth and their **2** children in TLP

25 youth and children served including: **5** parenting youth and their **8** children in the STAR program

7,875 nights of housing provided

23 youth enrolled in school and G.E.D. classes (TLP and STAR)

31 youth obtained employment

2599 hours of case management life-skills education provided (TLP and STAR)

602 hours of case management and life skills hours provided (STAR)

STREET OUTREACH PROGRAM

Provides street-based critical services such as food, water and blankets to youth up to age 21 with nowhere to go. Many camp in the mountains, live in cars or sleep in abandoned buildings. Street Outreach also has a cozy Drop-In Center where youth go to get warm, take a shower, and receive the supportive services they need to leave the streets. Established in 1995. Located at 402 St. Francis Dr.

525 youth served (unduplicated)

6,690 survival items provided including: bags of food, water bottles, first-aid kits, sleeping bags, tents, clothing and hygiene kits

4,366 hours of case management provided

COMMUNITY COUNSELING CENTER

Professional counseling for youth in every program, their families, and community members. Many are homeless, at risk for becoming homeless, or are otherwise in crisis. Established in 1996. Located at 5686 B Agua Fria St.

123 clients served

760 hours of counseling provided

PREGNANT AND PARENTING YOUTH INITIATIVE

Provides safety, stability and wellness for young families, including pregnant and parenting teens, through housing and other assistance. Workshops and classes are offered on topics such as nutrition, health, child development, domestic violence and pregnancy prevention. Established in 2006. Located at 5686 B Agua Fria St.

42 youth and children served including: **15** pregnant and parenting youth and their **21** children

454 interventions including: clothing, baby formula, diapers, medical referrals for baby care, parent education classes and reproductive health instruction

COLD WEATHER SHELTER

Youth Shelters and Family Services provided three months of **Cold Weather Shelter** in December 2017 – February 2018. We set up bunkbeds and made a cozy and welcoming space so young people and their dependent children could safely sleep out of the elements. We provided transportation so that youth from all over Santa Fe could stay with us overnight if they wished to do so. Of the 16 unduplicated individuals served at Cold Weather Shelter, we were able to assist 11 become stably housed. Some were housed in our Transitional Living Program and some in our STAR program. Some found housing with collaborative housing partners in New Mexico and some, at their request, were reunited with their families.
